1. Introductory remarks

Study group chairperson Svanibor Pettan (hereafter SP) called the meeting to order at 13.15 WET. A delay was caused by the late end of the previous conference session. His introductory remarks included a warm welcome to all participants present on-site and online.

2. A brief historical overview of the study group

The Chairperson SP presented a chronological overview of the 25-year-old history of the study group, including the 11 symposia with the locations, themes, and respective publications, and welcomed interested members of ICTMD to join the study group. SP pointed out the joint meetings that took place twice with other study groups of ICTMD (in 2010 in Vietnam with the study group on applied ethnomusicology and in 2018 in Vienna with the study group on music, gender and sexuality).

The Vice-Chair Mayco Santaella gave a brief overview for the new study group members. He referred them to the ICTMD website for further information about the study group and about the definition of minorities for its needs (https://ictmusic.org/studygroup/minorities).

3. Membership data

The secretary of the Study Group Hande Sağlam reported on the membership status: currently the study group has 203 members from 49 countries on 5 continents (Asia, Australia, Europe, North America, South America). At this business meeting, 10 new scholars from different countries in Africa joined the study group. Each member attending the 24th business meeting briefly introduced him/herself themselves to the study group.

4. Approval of the 23rd business meeting minutes (Lisbon 2022)

The Chairperson provided a short summary of the minutes of the last meeting. The minutes of the study group's business meeting in Lisbon 2022 were approved with no amendments.

5. Website and Facebook presence

SP announced that the next symposium of the Study Group will be hosted by the University of Kelaniya in Sri Lanka in December 2023. It will have a joint day with the Study Group on Indigenous Music and Dance (hereafter IMD). Chair of the Local Arrangements Committee, Lasanthi Manaranjanie Kalinga Dona, provided an update about the venues and preparations of the event.

8. Yuh Fen Tseng announced that the first publication of the Study Group IMD had been finalised and promised to bring the book to Sri Lanka to present it. Marko Kölbl reported that due to several unforeseen reasons, the proceedings of the joint symposium of Study Groups on M&M and Music, Gender and Sexuality took longer than planned, but publication is expected in 2023.
